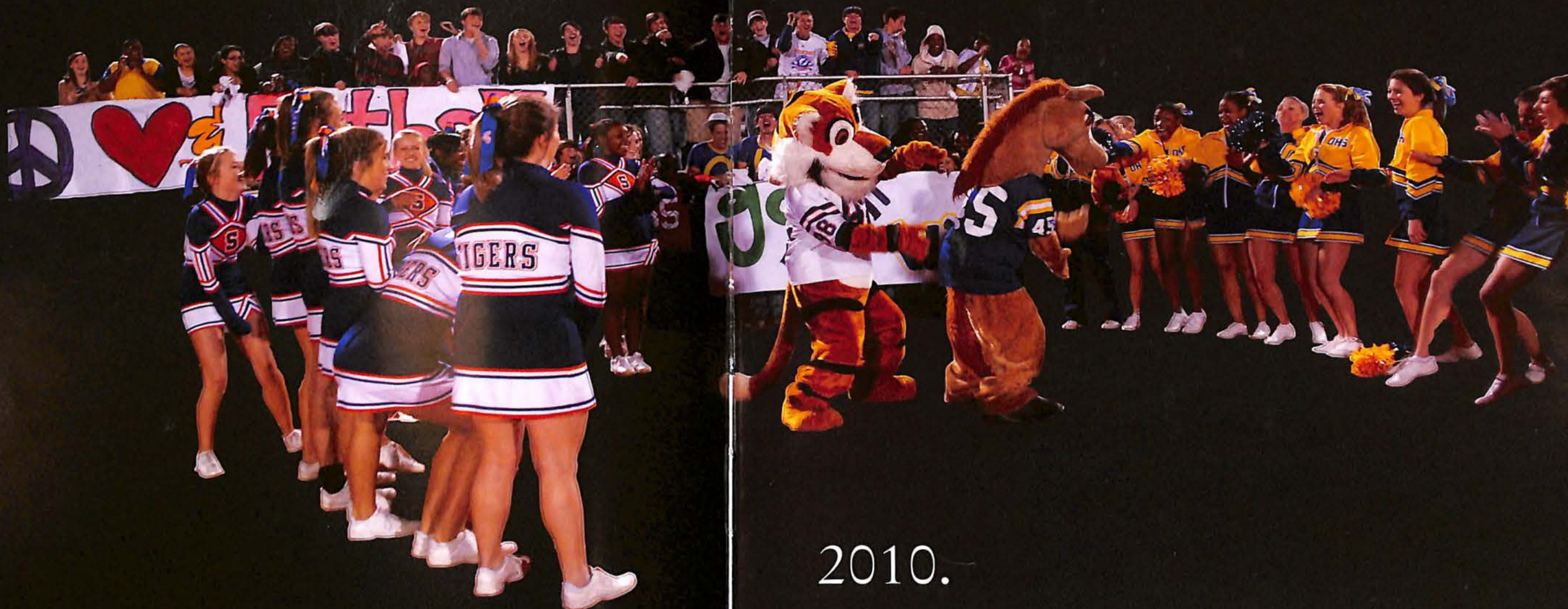

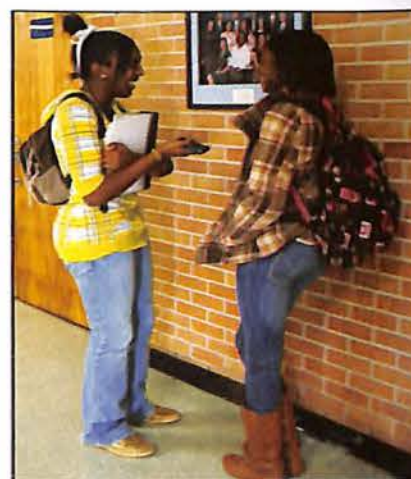

The 2009-2010 school year at Oxford High School was full of changes. One of those changes was that the juniors and seniors had to sit down in the commons in the mornings. That rule, however, did not "sit" too well with the seniors.

"We just felt like it was ridiculous to have to sit like we were in kindergarten," senior Lauren Steward said, "So we decided not to go in the building until the bell rang. The parking lot was the best place for all of us to hang together".

NEW RECORD FOR CHECK-OUTS

One burned-out wire was all it took to cause a fire in the transformer, shooting sparks and smoke and cutting all the electricity in the school. That one little wire sent the entire student body and faculty to the football field, evacuating the building in two-and-a-half minutes.

According to Assistant Principal Kathy Burnham, safety was the main concern.

"I understand that some parents may have viewed it as a waste of time to sit in the stands," Burnham said. "However, many enjoyed that time in the stadium."

Although the blow-out created a long break for students, it was a major inconvenience to the administration and to the teachers. Students missed classes and had tests interrupted. Class instruction? Out the window. And maybe most important of all for some students, the lunch schedule was completely off.

The rule about no cell phones was totally blown as well, as students called parents to come check them out. The office reported that 104 students checked out in one day, a new record for the school.

The students who stayed watched with envy as Assistant Principal Mike Martin blared name after name through his megaphone for students to leave the stadium as their parents came to get them.

"I wanted to get checked out because I felt like it was a waste of time to do nothing at school," sophomore Jack Schultz said, whose parents couldn't check him out because they were both at work.

"What was amazing," Burnham said, "was that many parents still checked their students out after the power came on."

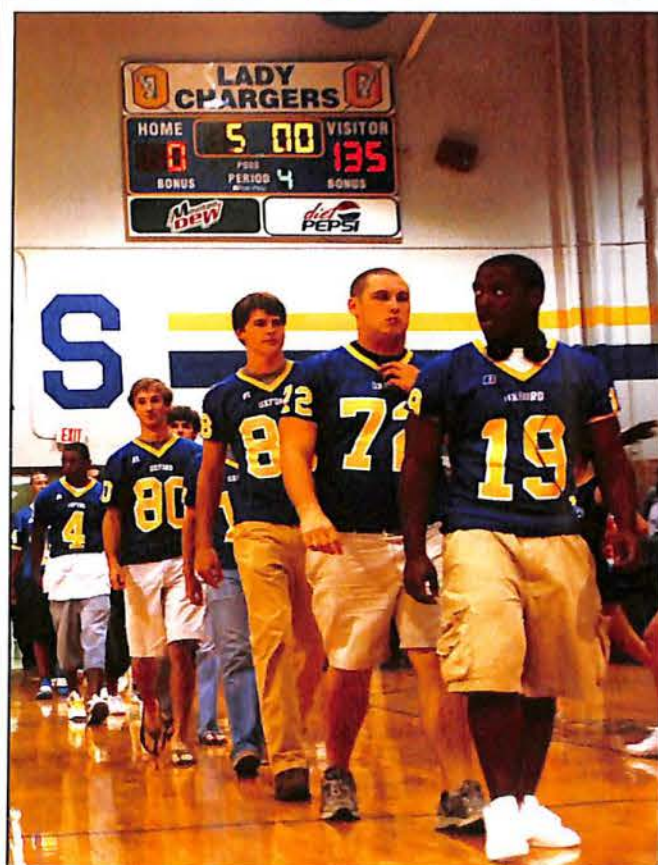

Days In The Snow

SCHOOLS CLOSED FOR TWO DAYS

On Wednesday night, students from all schools in the area begged and pleaded Mother Nature to give them a snow day.

Mother Nature answered their prayers and on the morning of January 7, 2010, the automated calling system announced that all schools were canceled.

The morning started out as white and puffy. Just an inch or two, but enough to cover the grass and trees. Surprisingly, most of it stayed for the rest of the weekend. The temperature on the 7th ranged from 14 degrees to 32 degrees. On the next day, it got colder, ranging from 9 degrees to 21 degrees. Even though the snow was light, it was enough to say "No School."

Whether or not students get a "snow day" depends on a group of directors from the School Board: Brian Harvey (Director of Human Services), Sonny Brownlee (Director of School Services), and Louis Brummett (Supervisor of Transportation). They have a set of pro-

cedures for a situation when bad weather is supposed to take place.

On the day of the snow day, Harvey and his team patrolled the streets to see if people were able to drive on them. They especially checked the bus routes, considering that buses are the most dependant form of transportation for kids in the morning.

"If the roads aren't safe to drive on, then school is canceled," Harvey said.

Snow in Oxford is rare. Actually, 2010 was the first year in a about 3 years that the temperature sank below freezing, and stayed freezing cold for at least a week. Therefore, students and others in the community took advantage of this cold weather and spent the majority of the day playing in the snow.

"It was just really awesome; it hasn't snowed in, like, five years," junior Emily Semmes said. "It was just really fun to sled, play in the snow, and make snow cream, all in all, a great day."

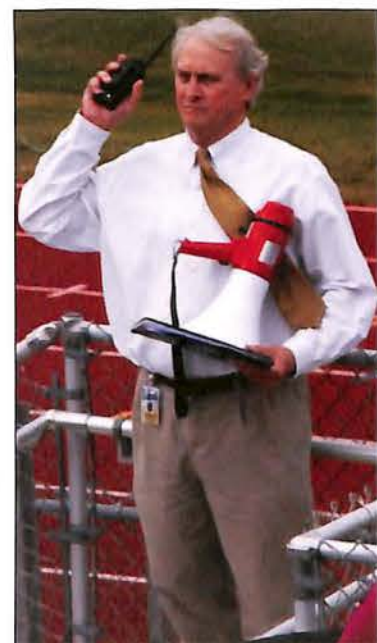

8. Class tardies have been limited to four without punishment
9. Lower classmen must sit in specific areas in the gym before school segregated by gender
10. "Reserved" cafeteria seating

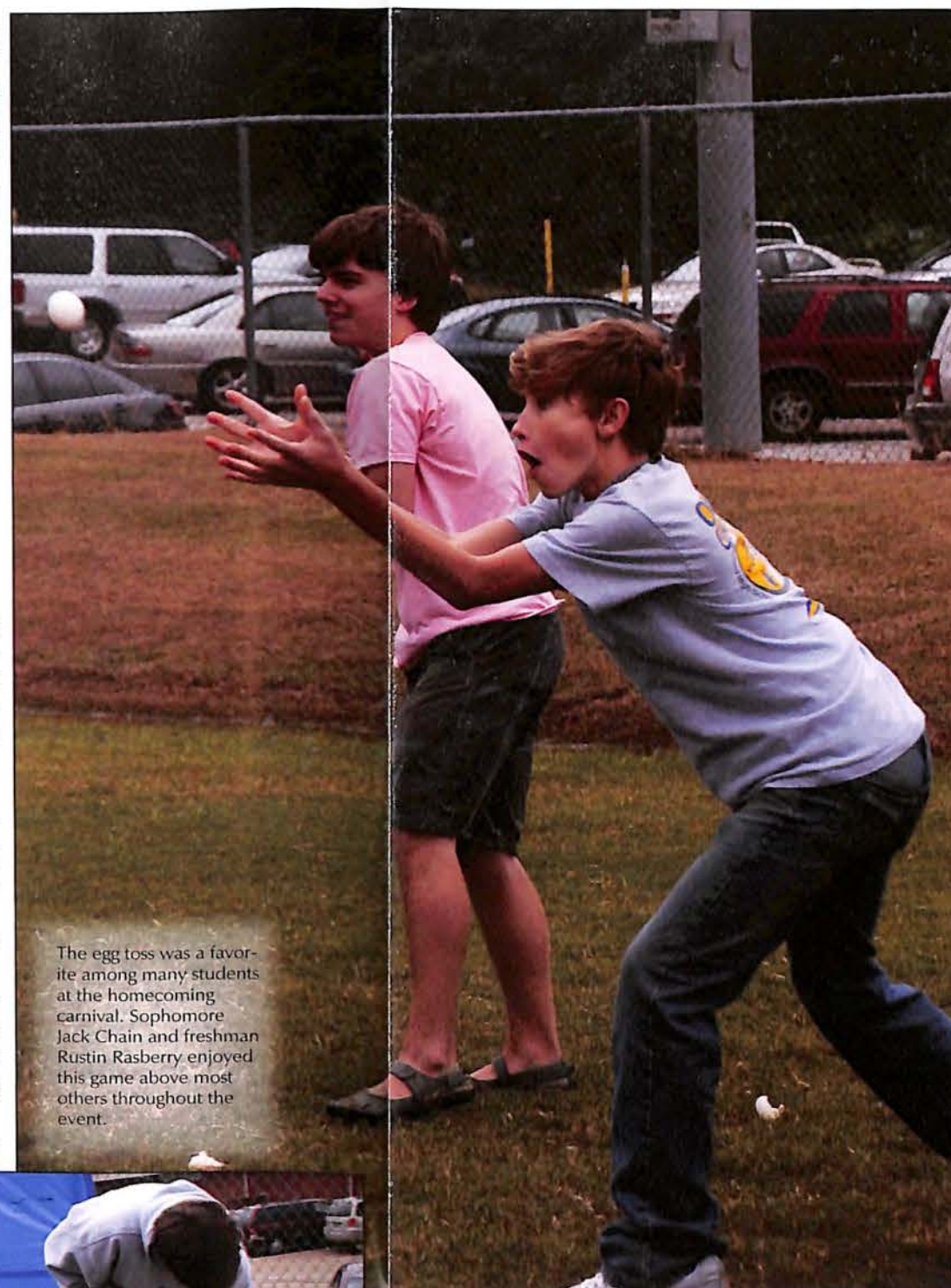

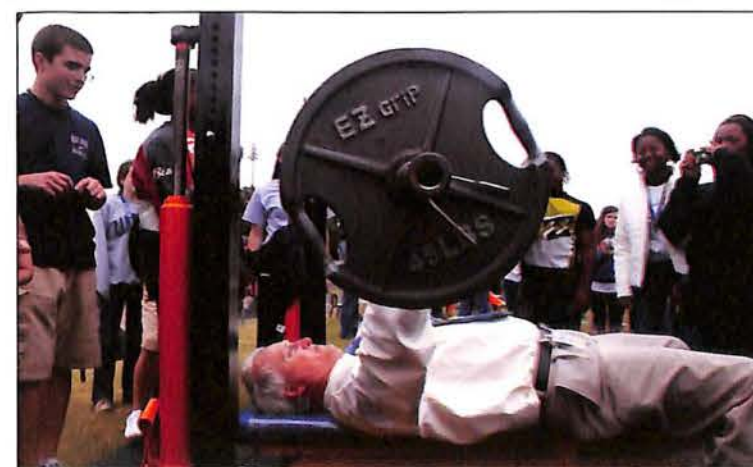

To help her with the pageant,

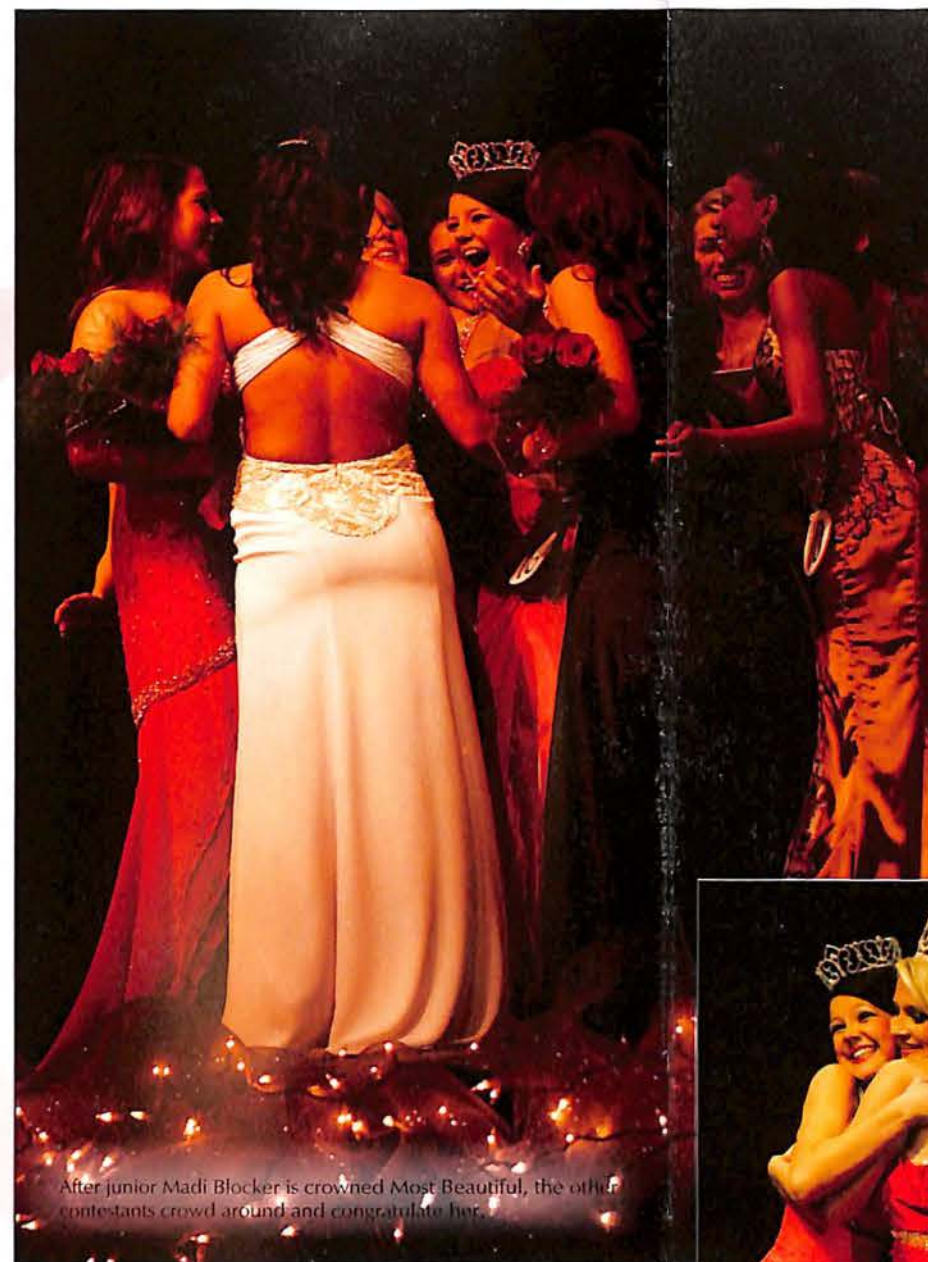

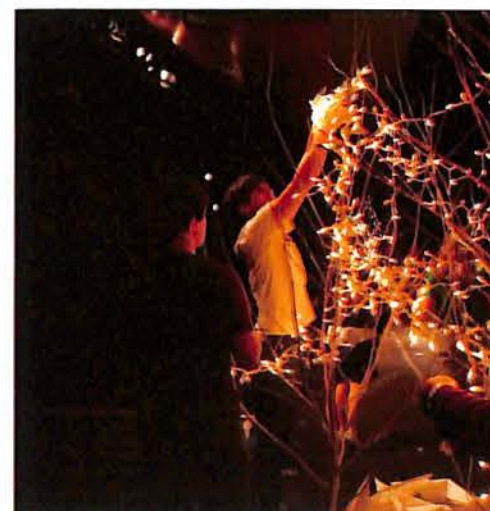

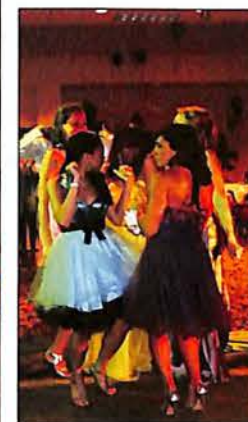

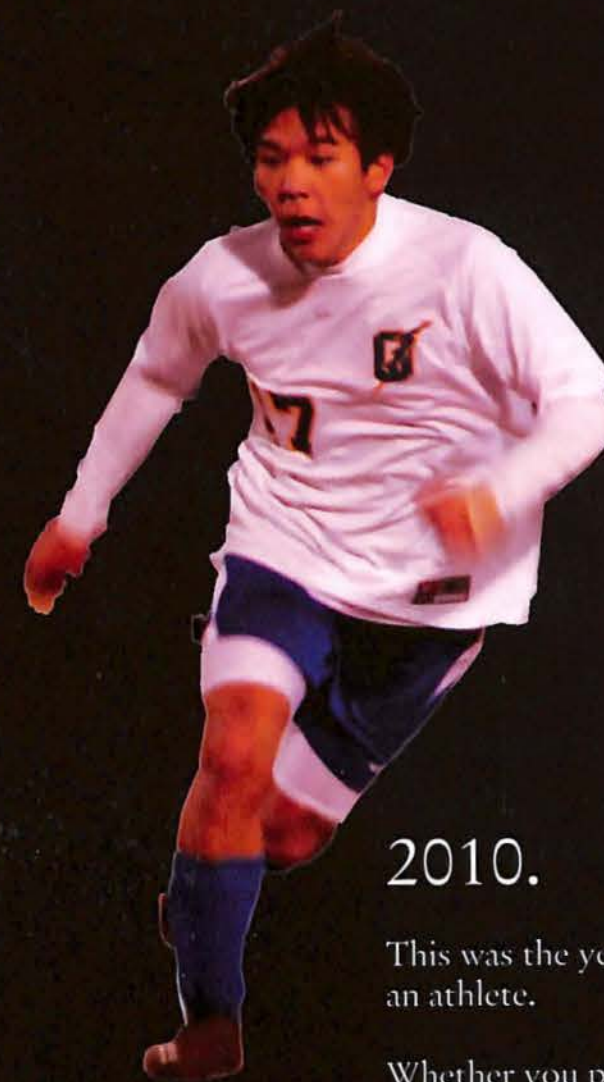

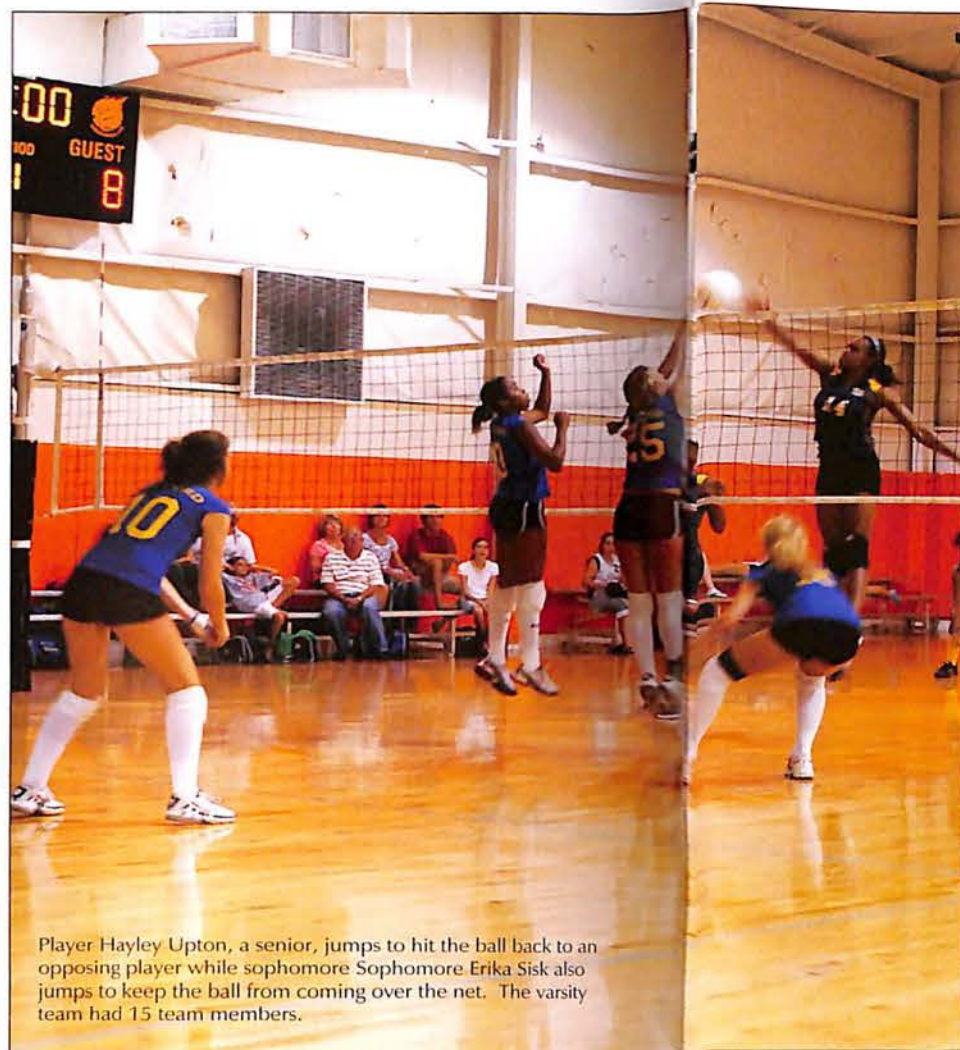

"I wouldn't change the players on varsity this year. We all worked hard," Lauren said. The Lady Charger varsity team finished with a record of 4-4 in the district.



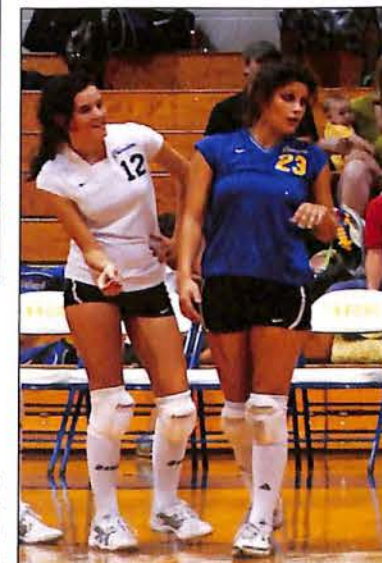

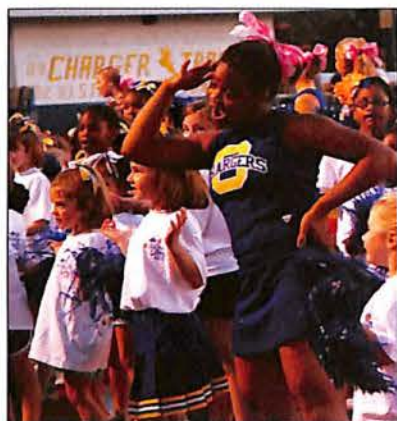
"They were like big girl cheerleaders," Clayton said of the youngsters. "You wouldn't even know that they were elementary kids."

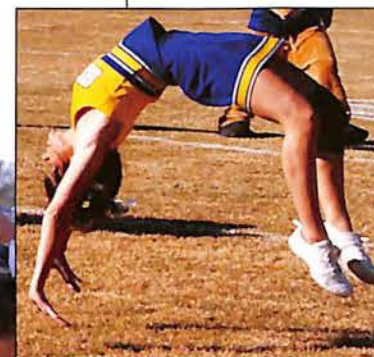

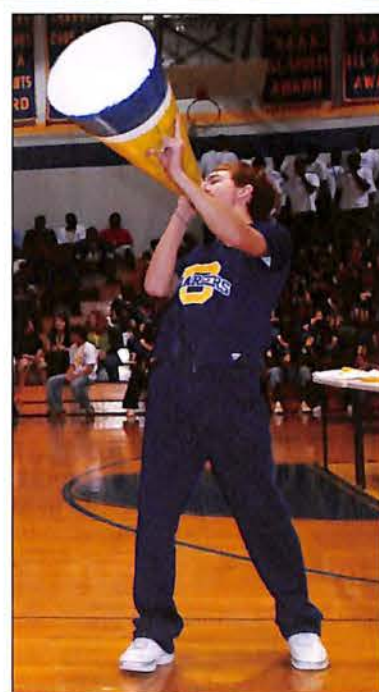

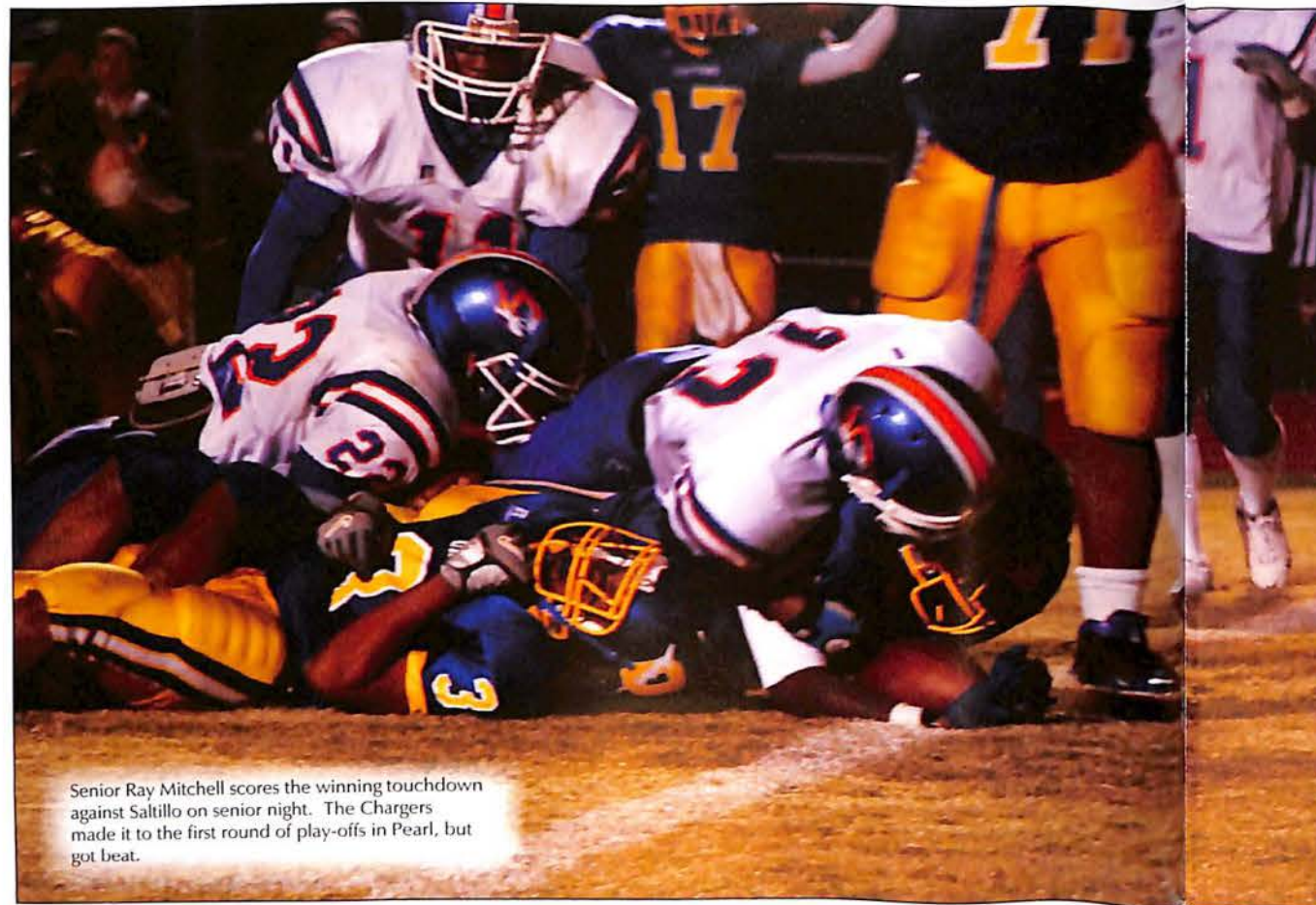

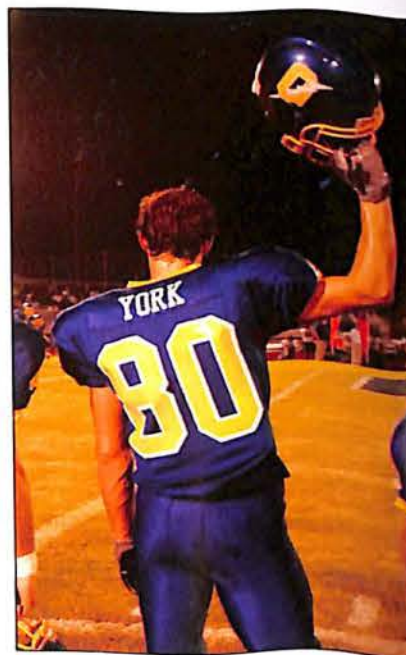

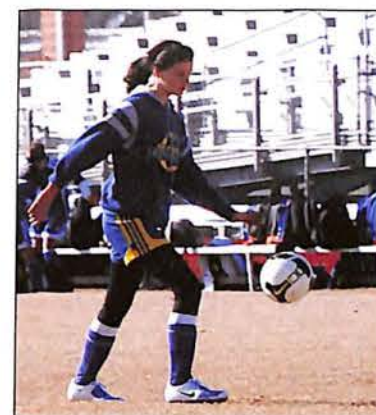

Watson loves practice, but always got home late.

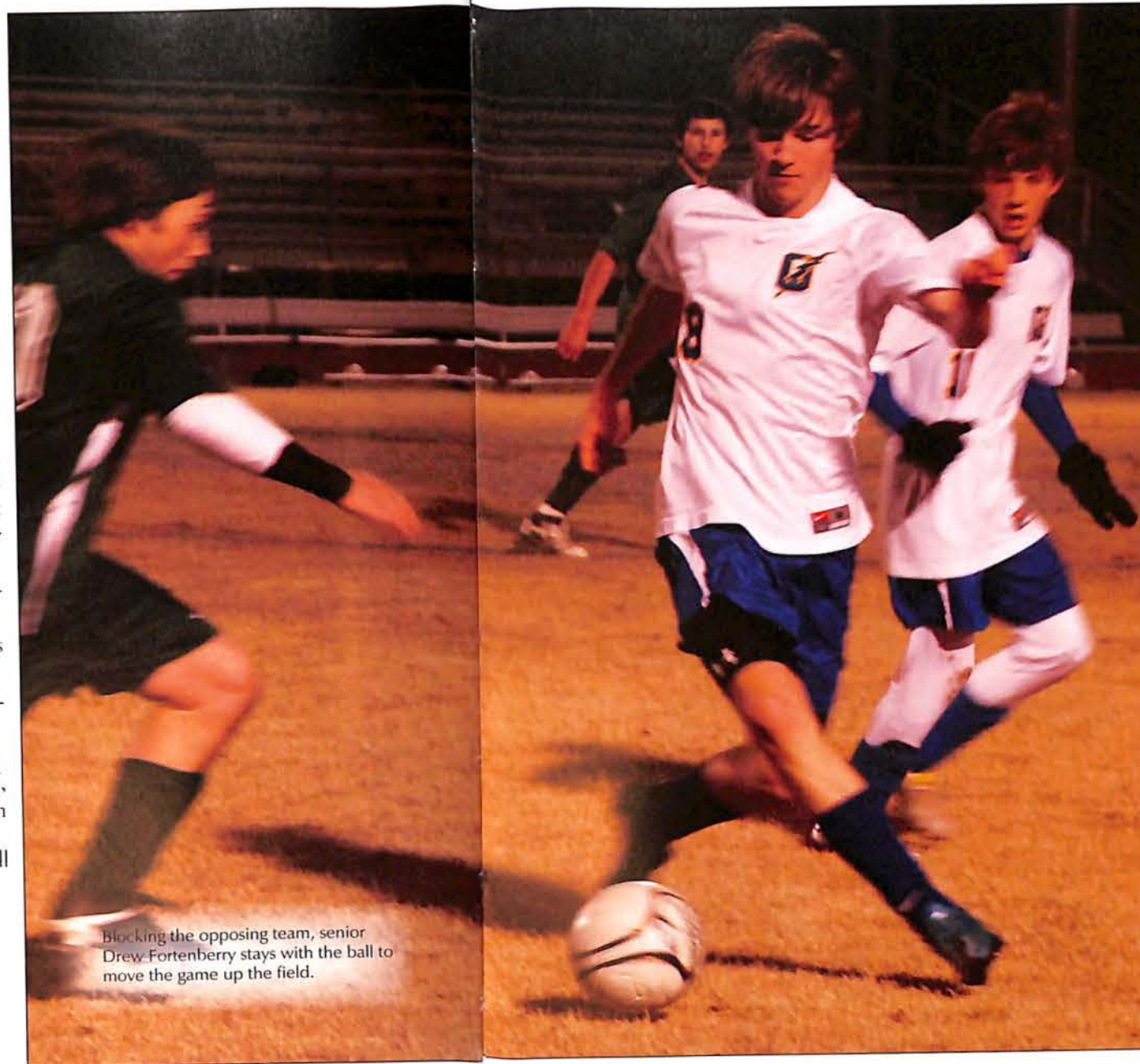
"I never got finished with my homework," Watson said.

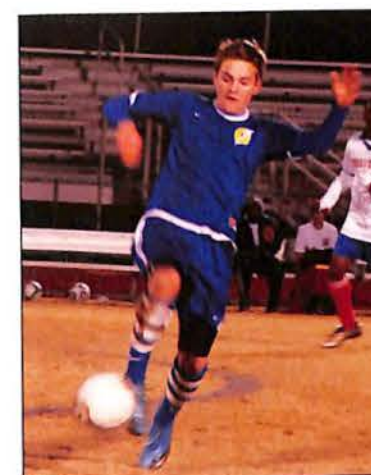

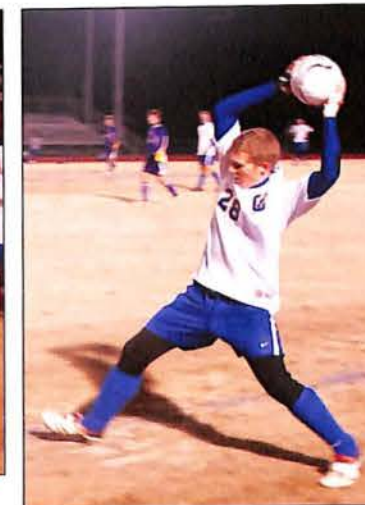

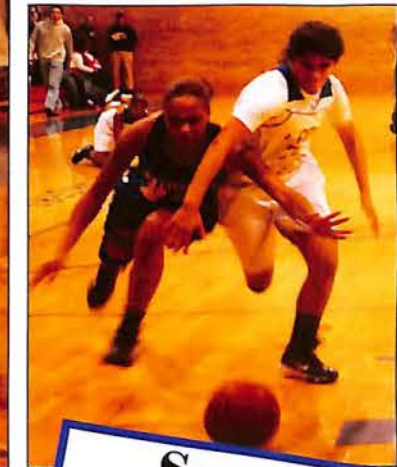

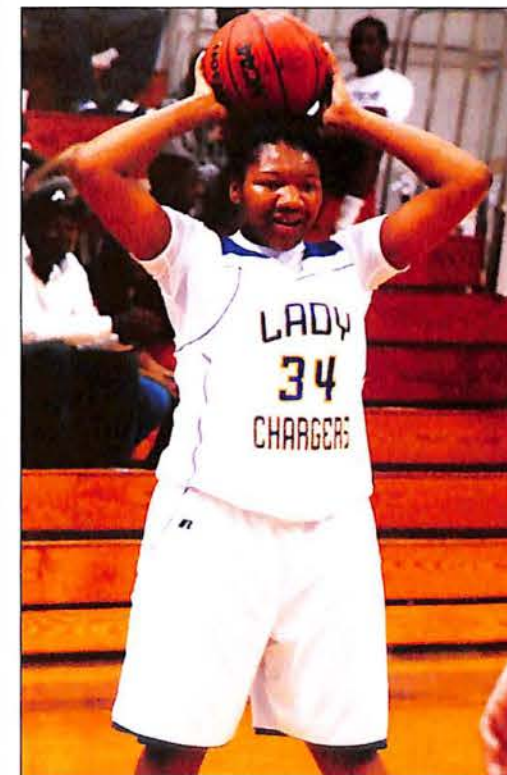

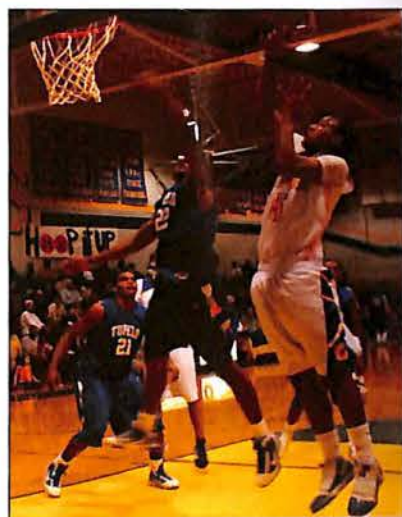

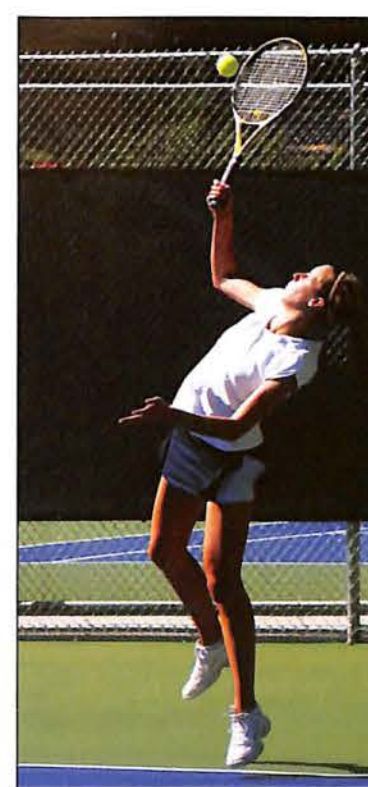

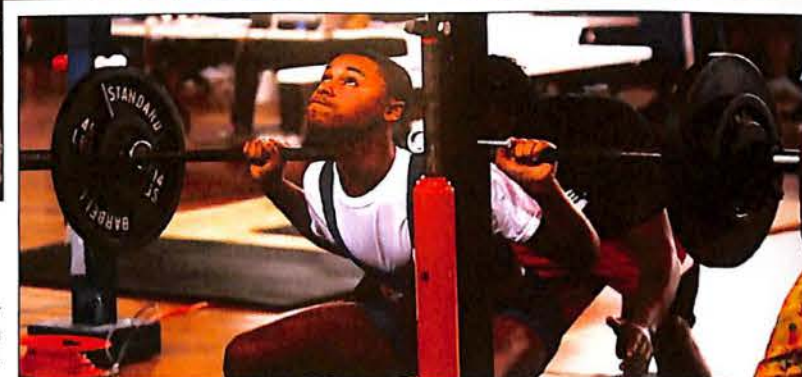

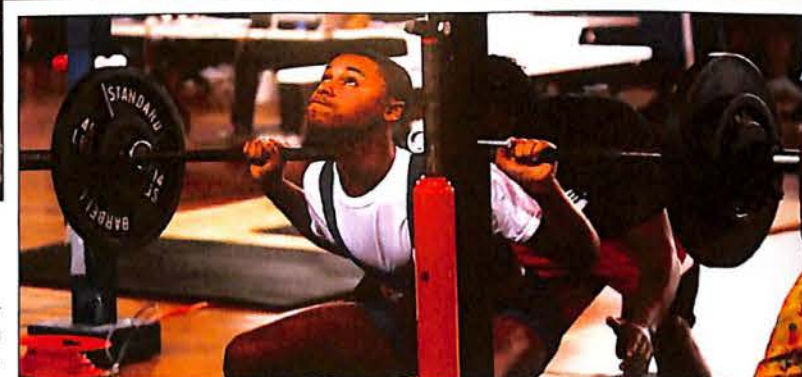

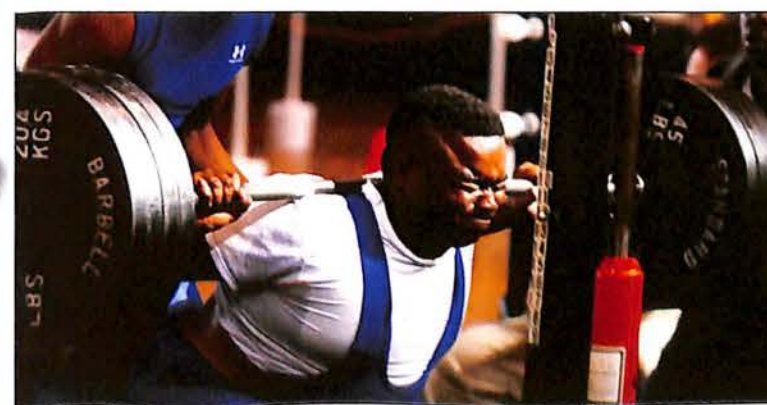

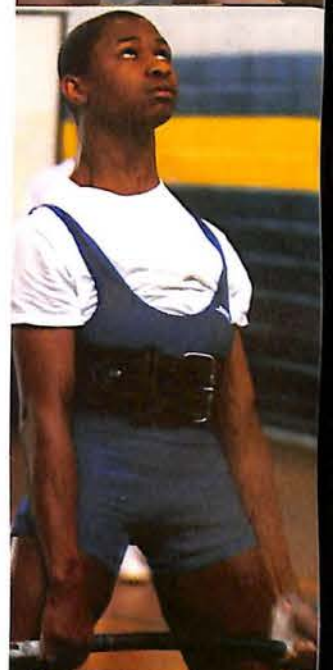

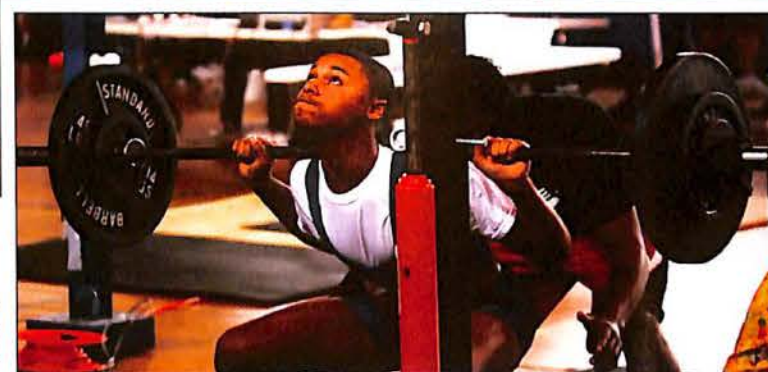

Colonel Jerrel Townsend has been inspecting cadets at OHS since 1996 when he began the Marine Corp Junior Reserve Officer Training program.

"Because of this program kids feel a sense of belonging that they may have not felt before. We at the MCJROTC program require our cadets to wear uniforms once a week and me and the Master Sergeant inspect them," Col. Townsend said.

Townsend says the cadets take pride in wearing the full Marine uniform, and some even wear them to events such as church.

Every week, Townsend and Master Sgt. Richard McCarty inspected the cadets.

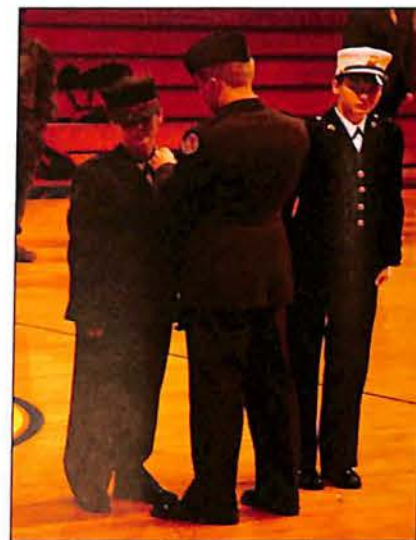
"The cadets learn a lot from the inspections, like personal bearing, thinking on their feet, and how to present themselves. We are allowed to ask

the cadets anything they should have learned throughout the year, and their grade reflects what they should have learned," Townsend said.

In addition to the weekly inspections, the cadets undergo an annual major headquarters inspection when the regional MCJROTC directors, who oversee all MCJROTC programs in Mississippi, Arkansas, Texas, and Alabama, come to do an inspection of all the cadets and the officers.

"The directors come and check up on us to ensure that everything is running smoothly and in accordance to the Marine Corp standards. The freshmen typically do better in the inspections than the older kids. The freshmen are terrified, and the older kids know what to expect," Townsend said.

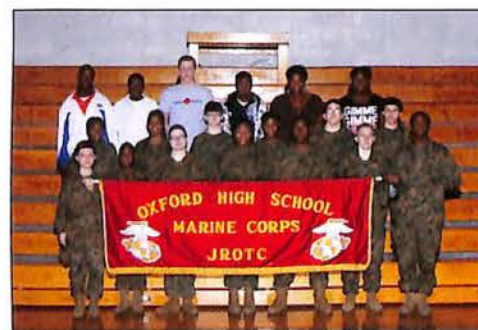

Not The 'Same Old Stuff'

TECHNOLOGY KEEPS CLASS ON CUTTING EDGE

Many people are scared of changing their old habits and ways, especially now when technology is advancing more quickly than ever. Dr. Barbara Lowe, however, is the exception.

Lowe says she loves learning about new technology and how she can use it in her classroom. She already uses an LCD projector, a SMARTboard and a flat screen TV every day, and she is learning to use ActiVision (clickers) so she can incorporate those with her teaching methods and test her students more quickly.

"Both they - and I - will get immediate feedback so it will be easier to know what I need to re-teach," Lowe said.

Ayat Abourashed, a freshman in one of Lowe's classes, says that the SMARTboard is very useful and is utilized a lot in Lowe's classes.

"We use it to watch videos on debates and how they are carried out," Abourashed said. "It is fun to use, and projection is pretty good on it."

Lowe said she uses her technology every day, whether it is for information, news, literature projects, or to aid in English grammar. Lowe uses an LCD projector for anything visual which the students need to see, like class directions, pictures, and information from websites. She also uses her flat screen TV to show students Channel One news every morning, and to watch movies about literary

works which the class has read. The SMARTboard is used more with grammar work, she said.

"The SMARTboard and clickers are especially popular," Lowe said. "Being able to move while learning really helps a lot of students. Immediate feedback helps out too," Lowe said.

In addition to getting results from students more rapidly, the technology gives students a new take on education and it is more entertaining than book work. Lowe says technology makes the class more "diverse and fun" and it keeps the students' attention longer than a regular class lecture or taking notes.

"Every day when we walk into her room there is always something up on the SMARTboard," freshman Sudu Upadhyay said. "Usually it's class directions or something along those lines."

Lakyn Collier, one of Lowe's debate students, says her class uses the computers a tremendous amount for research for their debate topics.

When Lowe began teaching, teachers did not have access to tools such as projectors, flat screen TV's, SMARTboards clickers, so Lowe says technology is a great commodity.

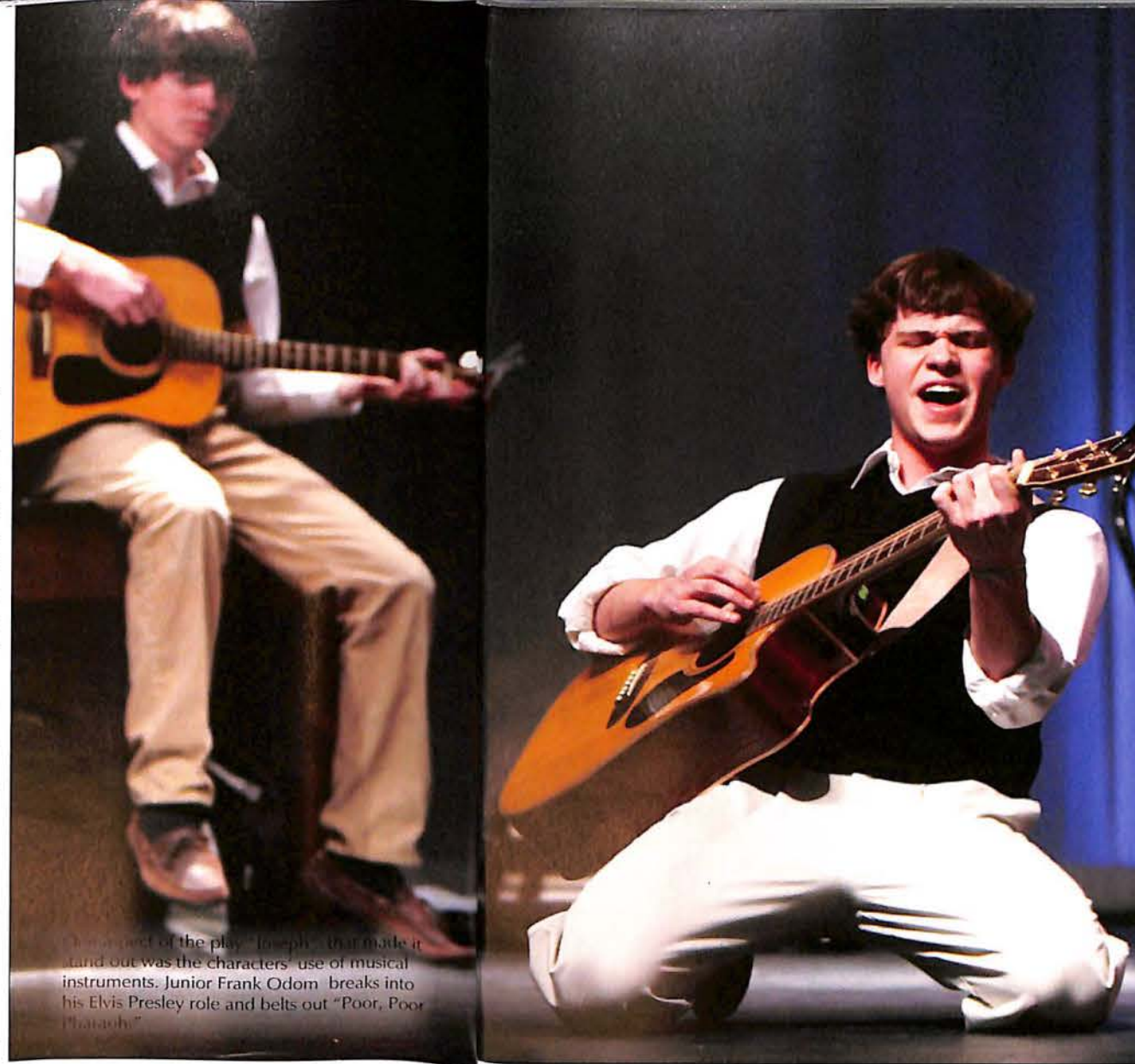
award. The recipient from OHS was senior Eli Williams.

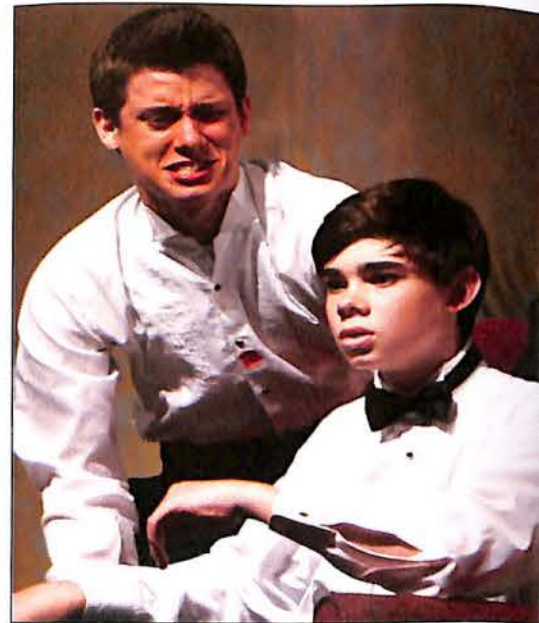

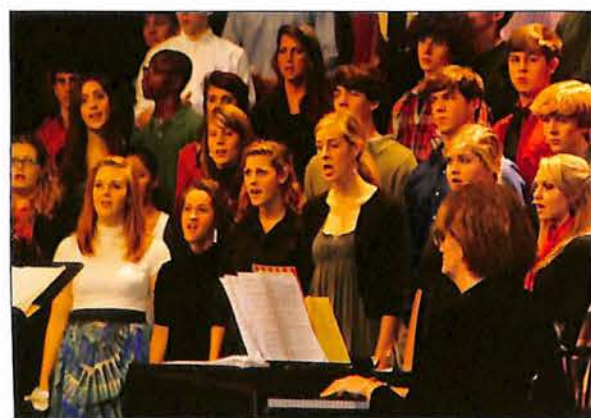

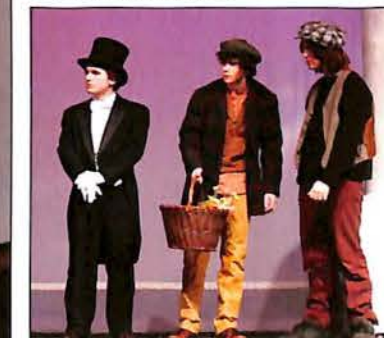
Mrs. Bonds made the musical possible year after year with her ability to teach music and with a love for her students and community.

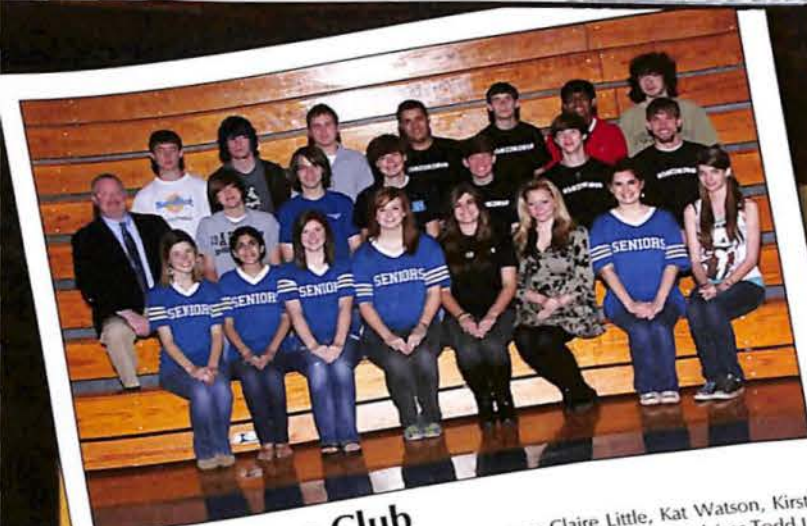

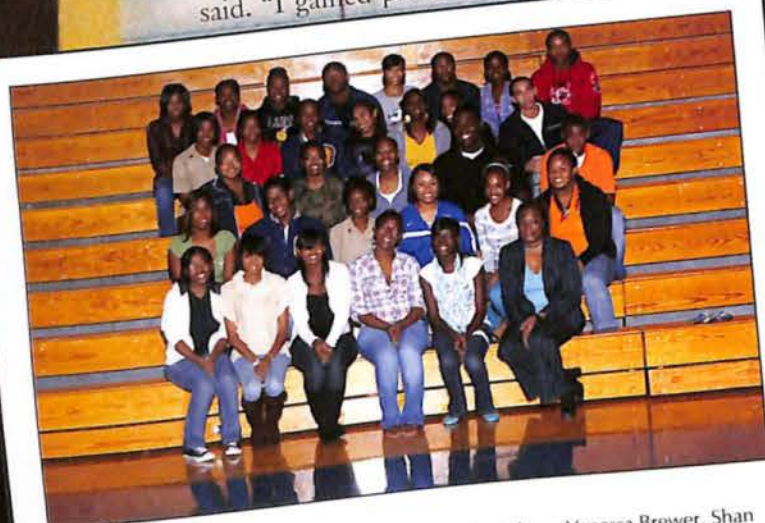

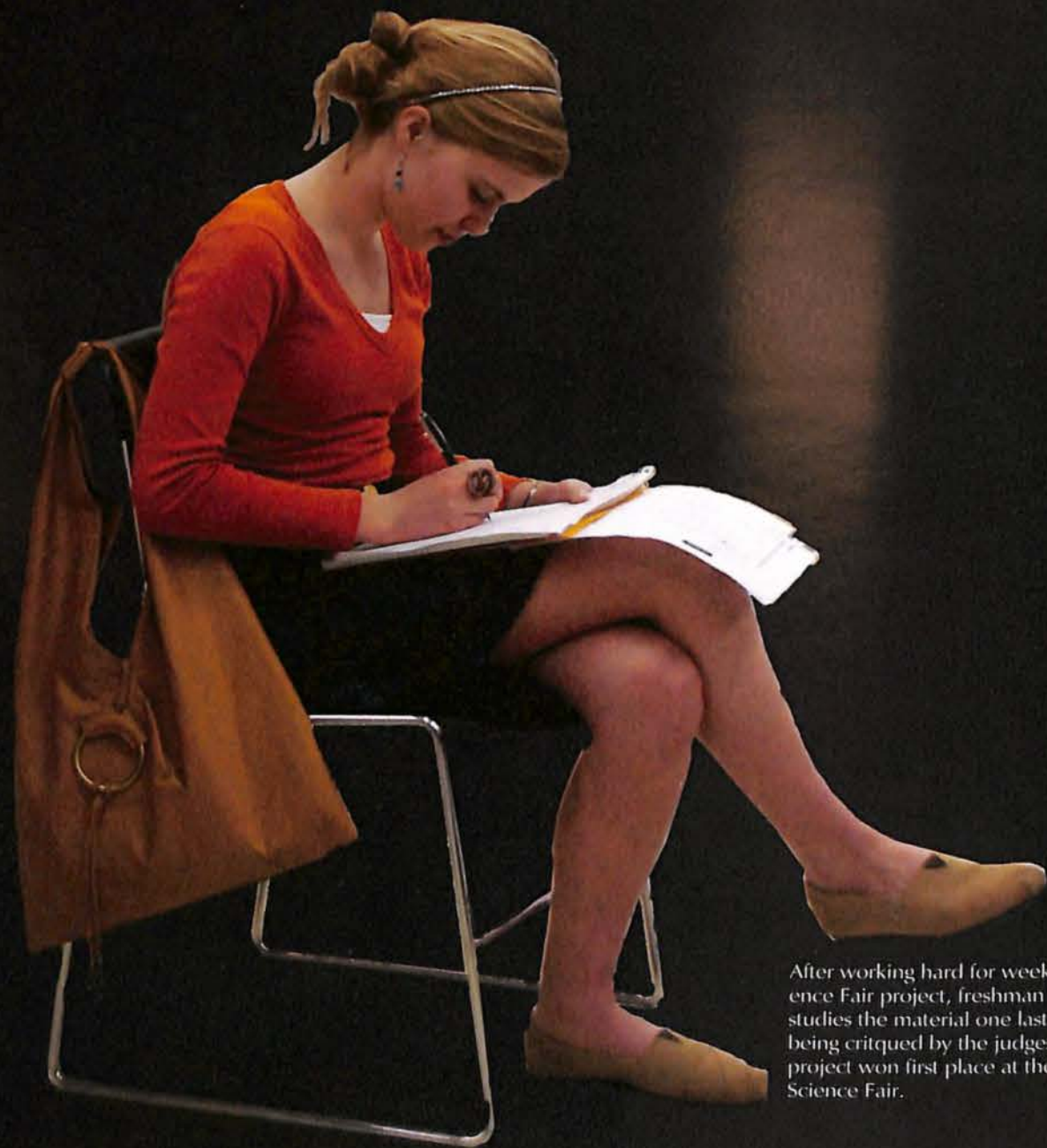

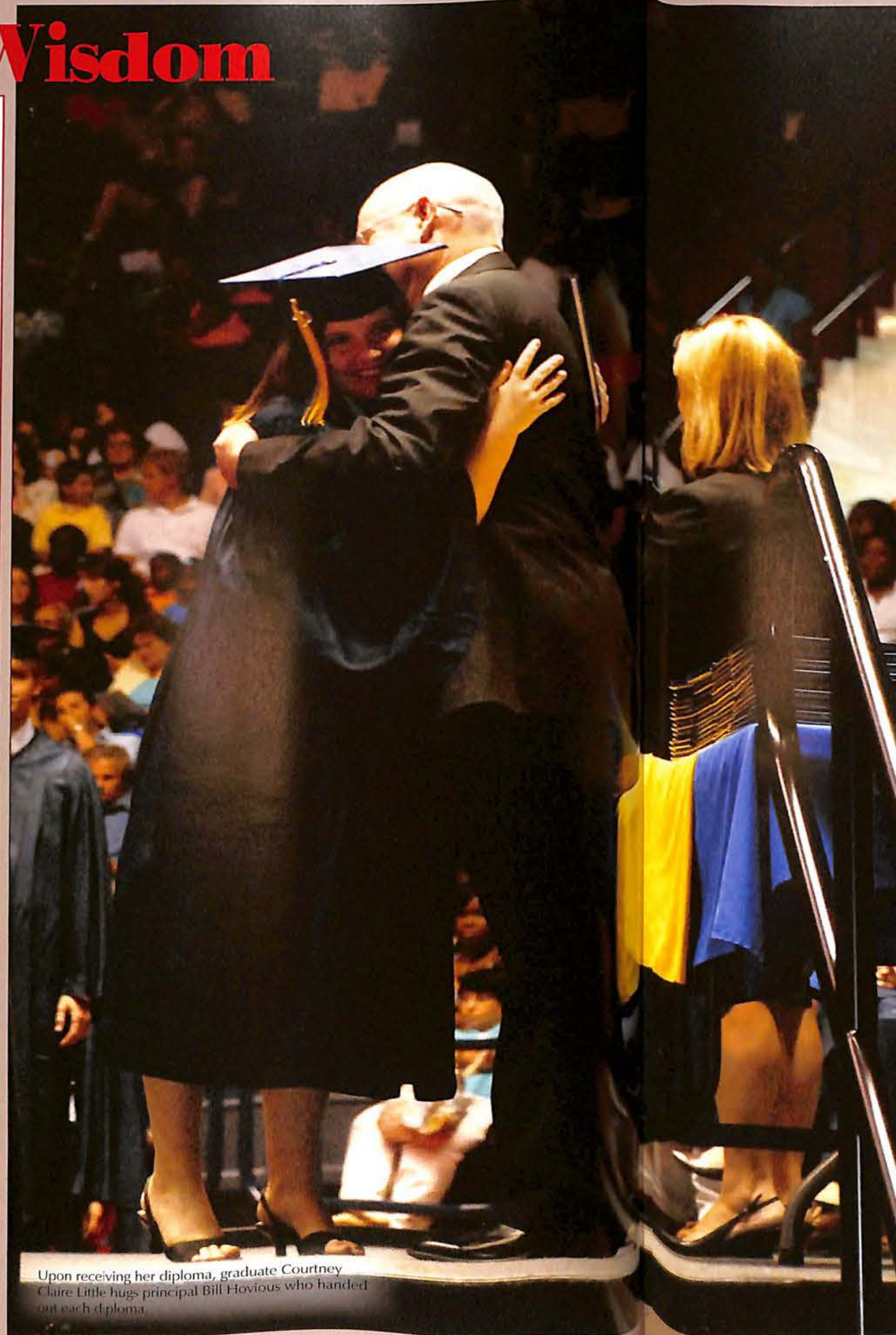
